

Create a Facebook* Fundraiser this #GivingTuesday





How to Setup a Facebook Fundraiser

Follow the screenshots below for step-by-step instructions on how to setup an individual #GivingTuesday fundraiser on Facebook.





Start your fundraiser with your personal story, photos, or share the stories and photos we provide below.

Tip: Photos that evoke feelings of pride in our work will best capture your family and friends' attention. We have provided stories below, along with links to photos you can use.

Finally, post your fundraiser! Donate a few dollars yourself before you share. This will inspire others to join you in giving!

Pro Tips

- Invite your friends and then to share the fundraiser on your page. Your friends can also share your fundraiser and invite their friends to donate.
- Check your fundraiser frequently and adjust accordingly. You may want to increase your fundraising goal if you reach it very quickly.
- Be sure to post a few times throughout Giving Tuesday. First thing in the
 morning, reminding people about the matching gift opportunity from Facebook.
 Another time midday encouraging people to help you get to your goal. And
 finally in the evening, for a final push to your goal.
- Thanking folks along the way in the comments will encourage others to give.
- Use incremental goals...if you are \$15 away from \$200 and your goal is \$500, ask someone to donate \$20 to get you over this milestone.
- Have fun!

Story #1 – STEM on College Campuses! (link to photo)

Please help me to help bring STEM education to Indigenous students this Giving Tuesday. Let's #GiveNative!

You're investing in the future of Indigenous people like Tvetene. Tvetene is of the Athabascan tribe and grew up in Alaska in the native village of Cantwell.

Tvetene was able to attend college at the University of Anchorage and received his bachelor's degree in civil engineering. It was there that he became a member of AISES.

He found that it was a wonderful space for connecting with other native American students. In 2016, he went to the AISES Leadership Conference, where he experienced his first Pow Wow and Talking Circle at the conference.

"The dancing really hit me," he continued. "It helped me see what our heritage looks like for others outside Alaska – how we're the same, but also different."

Tvetene is currently pursuing his doctorate in Environmental Engineering. He eventually wants to do research to develop renewable energy for Alaska.

"I want to help my people how I can."

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FAQs

Yes, we do get the money. As part of being a recipient of money donated through Facebook, AISES went through a vetting process with the company. This assures anyone giving to charitable causes on Facebook that their money is going to approved charities with verified IRS nonprofit status and valid banking accounts.

Yes, it's still tax deductible. Anyone donating via Facebook to a charity receives an automatic email from Facebook that can be used for tax purposes. We encourage anyone giving to AISES to include their email in their donation submission so we too may include a personal thank you.

No, there is no Facebook minimum to raise . . . or maximum You can set the bar low or high for the amount you want to raise. But there is a matching gift opportunity on #GivingTuesday that is described on the first page of this document in detail. Set up your fundraiser in advance, prep your friends and family before #GivingTuesday and then share your personal fundraiser early starting at 8 a.m. Eastern.

Yes, it can be anonymous. Donors can opt to make themselves and the amounts donated anonymous.

Yes, we do know it's your campaign. AISES can download transactions from Facebook and see per donation whose fundraiser campaign is credited.
